As little children in Sunday School, one of our first lessons was to obey the Golden Rule: You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself. The command to love your neighbor as yourself, or to not do to another what you would not want done to you is found in almost every culture. Muslims, Jews, Buddhists, Sikhs, atheists and others around the world: all are called to love their neighbors. But Christians have a new commandment. "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." (John 13:34) This is the command to love as Jesus loves. This is the grace that forgives and serves and heals. This is the love that reaches out and accompanies the one who is mourning, feeds the one who is hungry, and shelters the one who has no home.

Just Love was the theme of the Twelfth Triennial Convention of the Women of the ELCA. On September 18-21, 250 Voting Members came to the Sheraton Phoenix for the business convention. We worshipped and prayed for discernment. We shared Bible Study. The WELCA Board President, Joy Michalicek, presided over the meetings. Tuesday, September 19 through Thursday, September 21, new officers and board members were elected. By-laws changes and Memorials were adopted. The proposed Budget for 2024 was adopted. All of our business actions were shaped by our goal of living our Purpose and Mission with "Just Love." We closed the Convention with Worship and Installation of the new Executive Board.

Thursday, September 21, was the beginning of the Twelfth Triennial Gathering, *Just Love*. More than 1,100 women from the United States and a few other counties as well gathered at the Phoenix Convention Center. In the mornings, we came together for worship. Following worship, each morning, there were speakers whose stories inspired us with the meaning of "*Just Love*." On Thursday evening, following the opening session, there was a reception that had us dancing in the street!

In the afternoon, there were two time slots each day to select any of the Learning Opportunity Workshops or Servant Events. Several workshops and Servant Events explored Racial Justice. *Vance Blackfox* introduced the ELCA Truth and Healing Movement in the Learning Opportunity Workshop titled *"Indian 101."* One very popular session was a book discussion led by



We are getting closer to our Fall Gathering! Have you registered yet? Registration is live at https://www.flwelca.com/2023-fall-gathering.





# **UGLY FACTS ABOUT HUMAN TRAFFICKING**

U.S. law defines human trafficking as the use of force, fraud, or coercion to compel a person into commercial sex acts and/or labor against their will. Many of us think of human trafficking as sex trafficking or sexual in nature. Human trafficking can also be forcing someone to work against their will. In 2021, 10,359 situations of human trafficking were reported to the U.S. National Human Trafficking Hotline involving 16,554 individual victims. This number is likely only a fraction of the actual problem. According to all the reports I've read, anyone is a potential target of human trafficking. However, some people are more vulnerable than oth-

ers. The most vulnerable include people have recently relocated to an unfamiliar place. This can include relocation for jobs, family or migration from one area to another. Other vulnerable people include people with substance use, mental health concerns, runaways, homeless youth or young adults recently released from child services supervision.

Traffickers often identify potential victims and exploit their vulnerability to create a dependency on the trafficker. Despite many myths that traffickers are easily identifiable and/or they fit a specific profile, it's simply not true. Human traffickers are diverse, come in all ethnicities and genders as well as socioeconomic status. As we've recently seen in cases in Florida, perpetrators include many wealthy members of society who are not above using their wealth and privilege as a means of controlling their victims. They use threats, blackmail, violence, withholding of pay, withholding of needed documents or threats of deportation if the victim is an immigrant. In some instances, the perpetrator is a family member or even an intimate partner.

No matter the circumstance, no matter the legal status, ethnicity or economic status of the victim, human trafficking is illegal. The unfortunate thing is it is happening all around us, often right in front of us, but we don't recognize it, or we ignore those feelings that "something isn't right". It's hard to think of someone we know as a potential sex trafficker, an abuser, or a forced labor trafficker. No one wants to think that stand-up person, that pillar of society, that generous person we think we know so well, could be a predator. In recent years we've seen politicians, physicians, educators, coaches, business moguls, actors and neighbors arrested and convicted of the horrible crime of human trafficking.

What can we do without putting ourselves in the middle of a situation or accusing someone of trafficking other humans? Well, we can do a couple of things I'm going to list here. It's up to you to pick and choose what you and/or your congregation wish to do.

- 1. If you own a smartphone, download the app TraffickCam. This is a low involvement way to assist in locating victims. Every time you stay at a hotel, B&B, rental home or resort, open the app and take a picture of the room and upload it to the app. The pictures are collected and used to identify locations of women, men, and teens being sexually abused.
- 2. If you are in the US and believe someone may be a victim of human trafficking, call the 24-hour National Human Trafficking Hotline at 1-888-373-7888. All victims, whether US citizens or not, are eligible for services and immigration assistance.
- 3. If you believe you are encountering a victim of trafficking, call 911. Even though the dispatcher will ask for your information, you can decline to give self-identifying information yet still report someone you believe to be in danger.
- 4. Take a seminar or attend a workshop to learn the indicators of human trafficking. Better yet, have your congregation invite a speaker and sponsor a workshop. Many police departments and local or government agencies have speakers and information that can be provided to share.

Other things you can do individually or as a small group are to volunteer in the community supporting anti-trafficking efforts; volunteer at shelters educating residents on how to protect themselves from traffickers; or work with local schools to provide educational materials on trafficking because young people are potential targets.

Because human trafficking often involves forced labor, be aware of where your local produce comes from. The field workers may not have any control over their working conditions or may be paid less than legally allowed. Also try to be aware of where your clothes are manufactured. Many factories have been accused of being sweat shops, guilty of illegal labor practices or forced labor.

# **Archives Corner**

What do you do with all those papers you have accumulated as an officer of your Congregational WELCA Circle? If they are operational papers, you can add them to your congregation's Archives. These include directories, program papers, treasurer's reports, and other items that your circle has used for its meetings. You do not have to save the *Gather Magazine* or publications from the National Church; they should be archiving these themselves. There are archive guidelines on the ELCA website at <a href="https://www.elca.org/Archives">www.elca.org/Archives</a>.

Bank statements the IRS now says can be discarded after four years. The old guideline was seven, and some still keep things the seven years if they have the space. Treasurer's reports, after four years, just keep the year-end reports. Records of offerings, (in the church's case – the envelopes) can be discarded once they are recorded, but I recommend keeping them for at least a calendar year, as sometimes members have questions and want more proof than you might have recorded! Directories, keep forever; they provide a

historical record of your membership. Meeting minutes as well are kept forever. And, if you plan to write a history of your congregation's WELCA organization, minutes and directories provide you with some of the materials you need to do this. If you do undertake a history writing project and have not kept a repository of your files, talk to other members of your group. I can almost guarantee that one of them will have kept some of the items you need!

# **ELCA Fund for Leaders** *Scholarship*



Do you know a seminary student who is currently attending one of the ELCA seminaries? Encourage them to apply for the Fund for Leaders Scholarship(s) awarded by the Board of the Florida-Bahamas Synodical Women's Organization ("SWO").

Seminary students must meet the following criteria:

- Applicants must be in the candidacy process and have been verified with the Florida-Bahamas Synod Candidacy Chair.
- 2) Seminary students must be attending one of the eight ELCA seminaries and are either in the Master of Divinity (M.DIV), Master of Arts (MA), or Theological Education for Emerging Ministries (TEEM) programs.
- 3) Preference will be given to residents of the Florida-Bahamas Synod, female applicants, and active members of congregational units.
- 4) Applications will be accepted each year beginning on November 1 with a deadline of December 15 for submission.
- 5) The selected candidate(s) will be invited to attend the SWO's Fall Gathering, to participate in the weekend's activities, and to present a brief greeting. If the scholarship recipient(s) is unable to attend the Fall Gathering, a video may be submitted.
